At St. Peter's we are trying to close the gap between the world of work, where most people spend much of their time, and the faith that guides the way they live. Here is the latest in a series of articles that reveals what members of our congregation will be doing this time tomorrow; how their faith relates to their work and the challenges they face day by day...



I'm Sue Richardson and I work for Tyro Training, the commercial arm of Craven College of Further Education in Skipton. I work with individuals and groups in their workplaces enabling them to gain vocational qualifications or to extend their knowledge through continuing professional development, often via distance learning or one day bespoke courses.

Many are not academically inclined, or had poor educational experiences in early life, but have many other valuable qualities. I try to value them all as individuals with a contribution to make. It is rewarding to help people realise their worth, and put all this together to gain formal qualifications and expand their knowledge. Handing a certificate to someone who has

never had one before, and seeing the pleasure this gives, is priceless.

I've always wanted to do work that makes a difference in others' lives as I believe this is what God is calling us to do. Through contact with past students I have realised the impact we make can be positive down the generations. Passing on the importance of learning, I hope to encourage my learners to pass that on to younger family members.

Many that I meet are ill, frail, vulnerable, or facing huge personal challenges. I try to ask God to be with them, and those who love them and are caring for them. When wearing a cross at work, sometimes I am asked if I am a Christian. Of course I say yes, but find it difficult to take it further. I just hope that how they see me treat them and others will reflect Christianity to them.

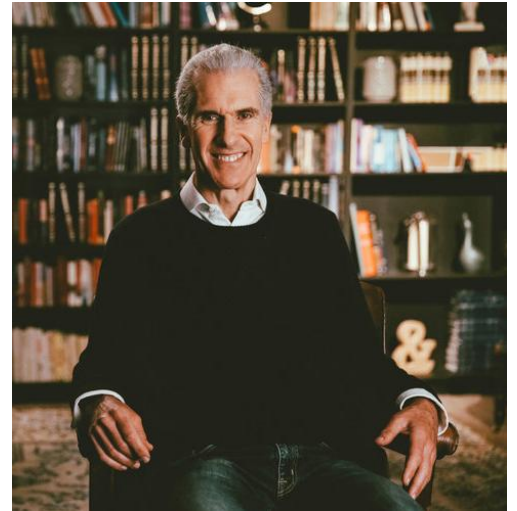
