#### For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed

In Holy Week Christians again follow the journey of Jesus from his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, through his suffering and death on the cross to his resurrection. This year you may also like to explore the links between these events and Passover with a special meal that draws us into the rich symbolism of our Jewish and Christian heritage.

The Seder is the Jewish ritual meal held on the first night of Passover – this year on Good Friday 30<sup>th</sup> March. Passover had already been celebrated for twelve centuries at the time of Jesus. It was one of three festivals for which observant Jews were required to go to Jerusalem. Central to the Seder is the preparation of a lamb, the retelling of the Exodus story, the passing of the cup of wine and the eating of unleavened bread.



The first Passover is documented in Exodus, chapter 12. God promised to kill the firstborn son in every household in Egypt, sparing only those Hebrews who followed the Passover instructions. They had to take their best lamb for slaughter and use its blood to mark around their doorposts with a hyssop branch. The angel of God would pass over the marked houses and leave the people inside unharmed. The Egyptians succumbed and immediately released the Hebrews from slavery.

The last meal Jesus shared with his disciples is described in all four gospels, it was to celebrate Passover and he was already aware of his coming Passion. Thus the meal became infused with added meaning, as Jesus himself assumed the role of the sacrificial lamb, giving his body (bread) and shedding his blood (wine) for the salvation of all. Henceforth, Christians would make the link between the liberating act of God in the Exodus story and the salvation won through Christ's death and resurrection.

As the early Church evolved and Christians came together to remember the death and resurrection of Jesus, the traditions of Judaism shaped their worship - including the celebration which we know today as Holy Communion. Each time we celebrate Communion we connect with a history that extends to our Jewish ancestors in faith. Sharing a Seder meal is one way to explore this history, so if you would like to come, on Monday 26<sup>th</sup> March at 6:00 pm, then please sign the list at the back of Church.


#### Passover and the Seder Meal


Passover will be celebrated by Jews all around the world from 30<sup>th</sup> March to 7<sup>th</sup> April 2018. Families and friends will gather to retell the story of how the children of Israel left slavery behind when they were led out of Egypt by Moses and to eat a traditional **Seder** meal together. Each food has a special significance:



- a lamb bone symbolises the sacrificial lamb;
- a roasted egg represents all those who have faced loss and mourning;
- parsley dipped in salt water is a reminder of the tears shed by the slaves;
- **bitter herbs** symbolise the bitterness of slavery;
- a sweet paste made of apples, nuts and spices represents the clay the slaves used to make bricks for their Egyptian masters;
- unleavened bread is eaten as, in their haste to escape, the slaves did not have time to wait for their bread to rise.

#### Then:


A speck of pink appeared among the trees, I followed it with bright and eager eye; and, delicately bending to the breeze, one small, pale blossom braved a winter sky.


