An update from Compassion in Rwanda: October 2020

Many of us at St Peter's sponsor a child through the charity *Compassion*. Clare Nelson, their Regional Partnerships Manager has sent an update on the projects:

Rwanda has been recording more COVID-19 recoveries than new cases each day since 14th September. The country has recorded only 29 related deaths as of 7th October. Some shops and schools have reopened, but a night-time curfew remains in place.

At this point, all Compassion projects in Rwanda are closed in order to abide by local guidelines. Staff members are still calling and checking in on families; and because of the generous support of sponsors and donors they have been able to distribute 74,964 food packs and 255,953 hygiene kits to the children and their families.

The majority of letters are delayed in Rwanda, which means it may take longer for you to receive letters from your child. But that doesn't mean you shouldn't write! We encourage you to continue sending your sponsored child letters of encouragement and hope. What a joyful day it will be when those letters are delivered!
